

To: The Honorable Governor Sam Brownback, State of Kansas

Subject: Update on Information on the Feasibility of Establishing a Dental School in Kansas

It is our intent to provide you with additional information on an estimated timetable for building the school, equipping the facility, recruiting students and faculty and developing a pipeline strategy. This strategy will use satellite dental clinic sites in rural Kansas to provide care and encourage young men and women from these areas to become engaged in dental practice.

There are several attachments to this letter to update and provide estimates as the process progresses from the:

1. Initial feasibility study, to
2. Appropriations to build and
3. Equip the dental school
4. Recruitment of faculty and
5. Students and
6. Introduction of the Pipeline Strategy, which will be a core component in student selection, education and their practice location after their dental school education is completed.

Table 1: Shows the number and age distribution of actively practicing dentists in Kansas for the past six years (2007-2012). Over the last four years, the number has stabilized between 1329 to 1347 dentists.

Table 2: Shows the projected number of actively practicing dentists in Kansas for the next four decades, if a dental school (or perhaps another solution) is not implemented. The population is estimated to be over 3.3 million in 2040 and 3.5 million in 2050. It is likely that all baby boomers will have retired by the 2030's.

Table 3: Prepared by Mr. Kim Moore, shows some revealing data about the effect of class size and retention of graduates immediately after graduation. The class size of 60 is highlighted with 80% retention in Kansas at graduation. The other 20% (n=12) would likely pursue specialty education elsewhere and would be encouraged to return to Kansas to practice 3 to 5 years later. It should be noted that reaching the current level of 47.1 dentists per 100,000 population in Kansas will take several decades with a class size of 60 and 80% retention.

Table 4: Shows a Possible Timetable for Finances (Column 1); Feasibility Study and Construction (Column 2); and Accreditation and Recruitment of Faculty and Staff (Column 3). This table takes us through to the graduation of the first class in May 2021, academic year (2020-2021).

Table 5: Dental School Preliminary Estimate of Costs. The costs are shown as Annual Ongoing, \$19,280,000; Initial Startup, \$57,990,000; and Potential Annual Income (tuition, clinic income), \$11,600,000.

These cost estimates are subject to reworking as the process goes forward. In particular, it is expected that the cost for dental chairs, general equipment, computer costs and start up, together with some faculty positions, will save at least \$10 million in startup costs and ongoing costs.

Finally, it is essential to stress the importance of the Pipeline Strategy in the establishment of the dental school in Kansas. The concept is to use this strategy in the recruitment of Kansans into our dental school not only from Wichita, Kansas City, and students in KU, KSU and WSU who are from major urban and suburban populations, but to identify young men and women from rural areas of Kansas and encourage them to pursue dentistry as a career choice. We would increase recruitment efforts in Emporia, Pittsburg, Dodge City, Garden City, Hayes, Salina, Junction City and areas north of I-70 (see attached Map of Kansas). These cities and areas will be the beginning of the pipeline and the students who participate in the pipeline program will be offered advice and support during their undergraduate experience in preparing for dental school.

Obviously, these young men and women will be encouraged to apply for dental school and their rural background taken into consideration as long as they meet the necessary standards related to their science GPA and performance on the Dental Aptitude Test (DAT).

The pipeline will continue throughout dental school and particularly in their fourth year when the students will spend at least 50% of their program in off-site clinics in rural Kansas. This program will provide all students with the experience of delivering dental care in rural areas commonly associated with dental shortage or dental desert areas.

Upon graduation, the WSUCOD offers opportunities for students to enroll in the advanced education in general dentistry program, which is a two-year internship, the second year of which will be spent full-time in one of the six off-site dental clinics which may be part of the WSUCOD or perhaps FQHC facilities in for example, Pittsburg, Emporia, Salina, Hayes, Garden City, or Dodge City. This part of the pipeline concept will be the measure of success of the program. Success will be assessed by following the practice location of the second year AEGD residents. It is hoped that they will continue to practice, as private practitioners or in FQHC's or other perhaps private offices or clinics and continue to provide care for rural communities. They will also be expected to be mentors for potential future dentists in rural neighborhoods and colleges.
