# 2024-2025 KANSAS POSTSECONDARY TECHNICAL EDUCATION AUTHORITY GOALS



## Goals

1. Explore opportunities to diversify the funding base for Adult Education services to ensure expansion and sustainability of those services. Activities could include identification and active pursuit of potential funding sources such as grants, private partnerships, and government funding programs.
2. Identify and share best practices in reducing and/or eliminating the actual fees high school students participating in the Excel in CTE programs are assessed and ensure actual costs and potential subsidies are adequately communicated.
3. Explore methods to ensure data used to calculate the components of the instructional cost model represent actual costs.
4. Resume program performance reviews using previously established criteria to validate and communicate the value of technical education in developing a skilled workforce and meeting the needs of business and industry.
5. Improve collaboration and integration of programs between Community Colleges and Technical Colleges and Adult Education centers to streamline joint programs, educational pathways, and communication channels ensuring seamless transitions for learners and between institutions.
6. Explore a methodology to share best practices and communicate student participation rates in work-based learning opportunities.
7. Work with Commerce in expanding the apprenticeship model and include a method for identifying and reporting the number of apprenticeships established and the number of apprentices participating.
8. Explore a method to report participation, promote awareness, and emphasize business & industry partnerships and the value of customized training occurring at the institutions using input from community colleges, technical colleges, and universities.
9. Enhance military articulation and support efforts.
10. Explore opportunities to enhance corrections programs and methods to communicate progress to meet workforce needs.

**REPORTS**

**REPORT FROM THE CHAIR**

Chair Frederick began by highlighting the Manhattan Tech ribbon-cutting ceremony for its new Advanced Technology Center held on August 29th. He extended congratulations to President Genandt and his team, as well as members of the community, for their strong business and industry partner support. Chair Frederick praised the event, noting it was a great success and expressed his admiration for the enthusiasm in the room.

**TEA MEMBER REPORTS**

Dr. Tiffany Anderson updated members regarding the CTE career exploration course she is teaching this semester, a planned visit to Washburn Tech with her students, the opportunity for her students to meet with legislators on October 30. Dr. Anderson also thanked those who responded regarding having students' representatives from her class and the Topeka Center for Advanced Learning & Careers (TCALC) speak to the TEA in November or December to discuss their career pathways and challenges. Dr. Anderson also suggested the curriculum committee may want to think about potential options for a teacher training pathway in the future. She looks forward to introducing these students in November or December.

**REPORT FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT FOR WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT**

Vice President White expressed her gratitude to Chair Frederick, her team at KBOR, Vice President Frisbie, and others who supported her after the recent death in her family. She acknowledged it had been a challenging month but proceeded to provide updates from the workforce development team.

She highlighted that the Perkins team is currently reviewing reserve grant applications, with \$500,000 in federal funds allocated for special population support projects. So far, they have received eight applications. Associate Director Wood will later provide an update on the projects funded last year, and VP White encouraged colleges to take advantage of this opportunity.

Additionally, the State Innovative Technology Grant is available, requiring a 1-to-1 match with business and industry partners. The deadline to apply is October 3rd. She also reminded everyone that the adult education provider RFP is open, with applications due by January 31, 2025. After that deadline, no new adult education providers will be accepted until 2030, making it crucial for interested parties to apply on time.

Lastly, she mentioned that the workforce development team would be attending the Kansas Workforce Innovation Conference on October 1 and 2, with an Accelerating Opportunity Training event scheduled the day before.

#### REPORT FROM THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES

President Amber Knoettgen of Cloud County Community College stepped in to provide a report on behalf of President Carter of Colby Community College. She highlighted that she shared the significance of these colleges at a recent Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) meeting and emphasized the critical role these institutions play in the state's higher education landscape and workforce development.

President Knoettgen also mentioned the recent data certification process for academic year 2024, which was completed by September 6 and expressed gratitude to KBOR staff for their support in this labor-intensive process, noting the improvements in data accuracy and reporting tools over the past five years.

President Knoettgen expressed optimism about fall 2024 enrollment trends, noting an overall increase across community colleges, and stressed the strong relationships between colleges and local industries, which have led to updated facilities and programs tailored to workforce needs.

President Knoettgen concluded by highlighting several programs at full capacity, including nursing, allied health, welding, criminal justice, automotive technology, and cybersecurity. She expressed hope that this growth would lead to an increase in the college-going rate and more credentials earned, aligning with KBOR's strategic plan. Overall, she was proud of the progress and the contributions of community and technical colleges to Kansas' talent pipeline.

#### REPORT FROM THE TECHNICAL COLLEGES

President Genandt discussed a document included in the packet, which he had shared with the Regents. He emphasized that it reflected only a portion of the group's efforts but highlighted that their institutions have the same accreditation as the state universities and community colleges. He referenced a report called *The Rising Storm*, detailing an impending workforce shortage, especially in blue-collar jobs, as the Baby Boomer generation rapidly retires. He stressed the critical need for workers in areas like plumbing, electrical work, and automotive repair.

President Genandt praised the efforts of various institutions. For example, Washburn Tech has experienced strong enrollment growth, necessitating more classroom space and collaboration with school districts. Fort Hays State University and its affiliated two-year colleges in Goodland and Beloit have also seen great community support, with a local Walmart featuring Fort Hays and affiliated colleges' merchandise. He also shared a student testimonial from one of Ben Schears, President - Fort Hays Tech Northwest students, highlighting how the cloud and crypto computing program has provided a fulfilling educational path. President Genandt mentioned the strong collaboration between two-year colleges and universities, noting how students sometimes transition from larger universities to technical schools when they find themselves unprepared.

President Genandt then highlighted the success of Wichita Tech, which was recognized as a Hispanic-serving institution, with 25% Hispanic enrollment, and celebrated its recent automotive center renovation, a project completed with private industry partners like Walser Automotive Group and WKI Kenworth.

Manhattan Technical College, where President Genandt serves, also had a recent ribbon-cutting ceremony for a new facility, which attracted an unexpectedly large crowd of 400 people. He proudly shared that they are now

purchasing a mobile VR lab to enhance both recruitment and instruction, aiming to have it operational by the end of the spring semester.

Overall, President Genandt expressed gratitude for the strong support from KBOR and the Regents over the past couple of years, which has led to significant growth and program development at their institutions.

**CONSIDERATION OF DISCUSSION AGENDA**

*Program and Curriculum Committee*

**ACT ON PROGRAM ALIGNMENT(S): INSTITUTION PROGRAM ALIGNMENT VERIFICATION PROJECT**

Associate Director Roberts introduced the Program Alignment Verification Project, aimed at ensuring the TEA is meeting original legislative requirements and aligning technical education programs to the needs of business and industry. Program Alignment has four primary objectives: obtaining industry input on required skills, identifying industry-recognized certifications, ensuring consistency in program structures, and reducing variability in program length.

Associate Director Roberts noted that some institutions were not currently fully compliant with the program alignment standards, prompting the need for a system-wide review. Noncompliance issues included inconsistent naming conventions, misaligned course structures, and unclear certification requirements.

To address these issues, staff recommended a multi-step strategy:

1. Institution Program Alignment Verification: Colleges will review their programs for compliance starting October 1, 2024, with the review closing on March 1, 2025. This will involve checking program structures across KHEDS Program Inventory, college catalog and degree maps, institution website, and other public program materials as well as completing a Verification spreadsheet.
2. Staff Review: Workforce development staff will assess each program's alignment and update the KHEDS system accordingly.
3. Annual Program Realignment Submission: Institutions will be required to complete alignment for each academic year by July 1.
4. Presidential Acknowledgement Letter: By August 1, institutions must submit a letter indicating which programs do not meet alignment requirements.
5. Verification Results: The outcomes of this verification process will be reported to the Technical Education Authority (TEA) in September 2025.

This comprehensive approach is designed to ensure that Kansas technical programs remain aligned with industry needs and comply with state standards.

Member David Reist posed a question regarding the Program Alignment Verification Project, inquiring whether it was a new initiative or part of an existing process, and how it differed from what had been in place.

In response, Associate Director Roberts explained that there is indeed a normal procedure for program alignment that involves updating the KHEDS system whenever a realignment or new program is introduced. Typically, she and Director Charmine Chambers review and approve these updates, which are conducted on a smaller scale. However, this new initiative represents a more comprehensive, systemwide effort to ensure all institutions are aligned, as previous checks have been limited in scope and intensive for staff.

Associate Director Roberts emphasized that this project serves as a "reboot," aimed at retraining institutions to ensure consistency across programs, particularly given the changes in staff at both the Kansas Board of Regents



(KBOR) and within the field over the years. The goal is to create a unified approach to program alignment that had been lacking previously.

During the meeting, Director Chambers provided additional context regarding the Program Alignment Verification Project. She noted that currently, there are only 25 aligned programs across the system, which represents a small fraction of the total programs offered. Due to the need to realign existing programs and work on articulation with K-12 partners, it is unlikely that new alignments will be added in the coming year.

Director Chambers emphasized that institutions offering aligned programs are always invited to participate in the alignment process, and institutional flexibility is evident in the credit hour requirements for certifications, which can vary significantly depending on the program to allow institutions to meet local business and industry needs.

Chair Frederick inquired if institutions objected to the concept of alignment. Associate Director Roberts clarified that while there generally are not outright objections, some institutions may need more flexibility to accommodate local industry requirements. She explained that sometimes institutions struggle to keep their KHEDS updates consistent with their public-facing materials, leading to discrepancies in program alignment.

Further discussion revealed that institutions might choose not to align a program if local industry demands require a quicker turnaround of graduates or if they wish to differentiate their program titles from the standardized names used in alignment. Associate Director Roberts stressed the importance of maintaining consistent program titles to facilitate credit transfers across institutions, ensuring students can move smoothly within the system.

Member Mikulka raised a question about the consequences of programs that are not aligned with state standards, particularly regarding state funding. Associate Director Roberts responded by noting that, according to current policy, programs must be aligned to receive Perkins funding if such alignment exists. She suggested that Director Charmine Chambers might provide further insights into the specifics of funding eligibility.

Director Chambers confirmed that the Perkins funding indeed requires alignment but clarified that there are no other funding sources currently tied to program alignment.

Member Mikulka then inquired about the nature of the aligned programs, asking if they were primarily in high-demand and high-wage fields. Director Chambers responded affirmatively, explaining that the 25 aligned programs represent a significant portion of high-demand, high-wage occupations in the state, including fields such as healthcare, registered nursing, practical nursing, automotive technology, electrical technology, HVAC, and welding. She emphasized that these programs have consistently been in high demand and are widely offered across the state, indicating a strategic focus on aligning programs that have a broad reach rather than those available at only a few institutions.

Member Mike Beene moved to approve the Program Alignment Verification Project. Member Hoover seconded. The motion carried.

*Other Matters*

BOARD OF REGENTS GOALS AY 25 (2024-2025)

In a recent meeting, Vice President Frisbie addressed the attendees, expressing gratitude for the support from Cloud Community College President Knoettgen and acknowledging the invaluable contributions of the data team. She emphasized the importance of data in decision-making processes at the campus level and highlighted the collaborative effort involved.

Vice President Frisbie took the opportunity to discuss the Board's strategic goals for the upcoming year, which revolve around three main pillars: enhancing student affordability, access, and success. She noted that while the

board has specific goals, each committee—such as the Curriculum and Program Committee and the Budget and Finance Committee—focuses on its unique objectives.

The Board's seven key goals include:

1. Expanding Access: Building on the success of initiatives like Excel and CTE to allow high school students to earn college credit.
2. Improving Transfer Processes: Facilitating smooth transitions for students transferring from two-year colleges to four-year universities.
3. Implementing Student Success Playbooks: Following recommendations from the National Institute of Student Success to enhance student progress toward their degrees.
4. Expanding Open Educational Resources: Increasing access to free educational materials to alleviate financial burdens on students.
5. Increasing FAFSA Completion Rates: Addressing challenges with the new FAFSA form to improve application rates among high school and other students.
6. Launching the Blueprint for Literacy: Collaborating with K-12 partners to ensure effective literacy training for teachers and students.
7. Documenting Alternative Credentials: Improving tracking and reporting of micro-credentials and other innovative educational offerings.

Additionally, Vice President Frisbie outlined the Board's focus on securing state investment in university research functions to stay competitive, as well as enhancing cybersecurity measures across the six state universities. The new governance policy for managing cybersecurity risks was approved during the September board meeting, aiming to protect sensitive data and improve collaboration among public universities, including Washburn University.

In summary, the Board of Regents is prioritizing initiatives that enhance student access and success while fostering innovation and safeguarding information across the state's higher education system.

#### 2025 VIRTUAL HEALTH CARE DAY

Jaron Caffrey, from the Kansas Hospital Association (KHA), shared updates on the planning of the 2025 Virtual Healthcare Career Day, which will be held on January 30, 2025. This event, co-hosted by the KHA, the Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR), and the Kansas Department of Education (KSDE), aims to showcase various healthcare careers through pre-recorded 20-minute "day in the life" videos, followed by live Q&A sessions. The event targets a wide audience, including middle school, high school, post-secondary students, and adult learners interested in career changes.

The 2025 event will feature eight healthcare careers, highlighting roles beyond traditional doctor and nurse positions. This year's profiles will include critical care nursing, family practice medicine, pharmacy (with both pharmacy technician and pharmacist pathways), occupational therapy (featuring both therapists and assistants), facilities management, health IT and cybersecurity, behavioral health, and respiratory therapy. Hospitals from across Kansas will participate, including AdventHealth in Kansas City, Rice County Community Healthcare, Rooks County Health Center, and the University of Kansas Health System.

Mr. Caffrey emphasized that healthcare institutions are like "miniature cities," requiring a wide range of professionals, both clinical and non-clinical. The inclusion of non-clinical roles like facilities management and cybersecurity reflects the evolving needs of healthcare facilities.

The event aims to attract even more participation than the previous year, which saw over 3,000 students from various educational institutions. Sponsorship opportunities are available, and schools like Barton Community College and Kansas City Kansas Community College have previously used the event to promote their healthcare

programs. Caffrey encouraged more colleges to get involved, noting the value in reaching students interested in healthcare careers and providing them with insight into educational programs available in Kansas.

He concluded by thanking KBOR and the community and technical colleges for their ongoing partnership in helping students explore the wide range of healthcare professions.

Chair Frederick asked about next steps for students after participating in the Virtual Healthcare Career Day. Jaron Caffrey explained that the event includes a dedicated "Next Steps" segment designed to provide guidance for participants. In previous years, representatives from the Board of Regents, the Department of Education, and organizations like HOSA (Health Occupations Students of America) provided general advice. However, for the upcoming 2025 event, the segment will be more focused and practical.

Mr. Caffrey outlined that this year's session will feature career advising personnel from colleges, faculty members, and high school representatives who will offer concrete suggestions for students. They will discuss relevant courses, extracurricular activities, and opportunities such as apprenticeships or direct job training in healthcare. The goal is to give students clear, actionable steps they can take after the event, such as courses to pursue, potential job opportunities, and pathways into healthcare careers.

Additionally, Caffrey mentioned the new "happyinhealthcare.org" website, which serves as a resource hub for scholarships, financial aid, and healthcare programs across Kansas. The site also includes a career quiz to help students explore fields that may interest them.

Chair Frederick expressed approval of this more structured approach, emphasizing the importance of helping students turn their excitement into tangible career paths. He also praised Caffrey's approach to encouraging sponsorships for the event.

#### METHODS OF ADMINISTRATION UPDATE

Associate Director Tobias Wood began by explaining the "Methods of Administration" (MOA), a crucial but often misunderstood aspect of career and technical education (CTE) oversight. The MOA ensures that institutions receiving federal financial aid for CTE comply with civil rights laws. Wood emphasized that although his role at the Kansas Board of Regents involves conducting reviews on behalf of the U.S. Office for Civil Rights (OCR), the Kansas Board of Regents is not part of the OCR.

Associate Director Wood explained that MOA activities are focused on ensuring both administrative and physical accessibility for students. This includes conducting desk audits to identify disproportionate enrollment of protected groups and ensuring that campuses meet physical accessibility standards under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The Kansas MOA plan, which was filed with OCR in 2020, outlines procedures for performing audits and reviews, all of which are available on the Kansas Board of Regents website.

Associate Director Wood detailed how the audits look for both underrepresentation and overrepresentation of protected groups in programs, as well as discrimination in areas like recruitment, admissions, and financial aid. Physical accessibility reviews are also conducted to ensure that campuses comply with ADA standards.

Additionally, he emphasized the importance of the continuous nondiscrimination notice that institutions are required to display. These notices should include key phrases like "the college does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, or disability," and must identify a Title IX coordinator with contact information.

Associate Director Wood concluded by offering technical assistance to institutions and invited those attending the upcoming Workforce Conference in Salina to join his pre-conference session on what compliance looks like. He expressed that this work is personally rewarding as it helps institutions become more accessible for students and staff.

FY24 PERKINS RESERVE GRANT OUTCOMES

Tobias Wood, Associate Director, discussed a specific grant opportunity, noting that Vice President White had already mentioned it, with additional references in the background and summary materials. He explained that a portion of the Perkins Reserve grant is set aside to address larger issues, especially core indicators of concern for the state, such as 3P1. This indicator measures the percentage of students pursuing nontraditional gender occupations, like female welders or male nurses, where the state is close to falling behind. Although still performing well overall, attention is being focused on improving in this area.

Associate Director Wood emphasized that special populations, identified in the issue paper, are at risk of not completing their education. To combat this, funds have been allocated for several years to projects aimed at reducing or eliminating these barriers. This grant was used to purchase classroom sets of tools, equipment, and resources. Various institutions stepped up, identifying these needs in their local assessments, and incorporating them into their four-year funding plans.

In FY24, several institutions received funding through the Perkins Reserve Grant. The institutions used the grant to acquire industry-standard equipment without raising student fees or, in some cases, directly reducing out-of-pocket costs. For example, Barton College was able to reduce costs by an estimated \$83 per student for ten years, while Johnson County reduced costs by \$75 to \$350 per student for their Allied Health programs. Fort Hays Tech provided toolkits for automotive students, ensuring that those without financial means could still participate fully. Other examples include Washburn University’s purchase of stethoscopes for respiratory care students and WSU Tech’s upgrade of a hybrid-flexible learning space, allowing students who could not attend in person to participate remotely.

Overall, these projects aim to support high-demand career programs and remove financial and logistical barriers for students, ensuring access to essential tools and education while maintaining affordability.

AY26 EXCEL IN CTE FEE COLLECTION

Director Charmine Chambers provided an update on the Excel in CTE fees data collection process. She noted that the data collection is open from September 16 to October 31. Webinar invitations were sent to business officers of technical and community colleges on September 5 and again on September 23, for the September 24 webinar. Additionally, invitations were sent to chief academic officers, business officers, presidents, and Kansas Higher Education Data System (KHEDS) users on September 24.

The webinar had 88 participants, with only two institutions absent. Director Chambers personally followed up with the absent institutions, providing them with the PowerPoint and recording from the session. The PowerPoint, recording, and FAQ are also posted on KHEDS.

One institution has already made updates, and Associate Director Roberts has addressed those changes, ensuring the process is progressing smoothly.

Chair Frederick reminded members that the next regularly scheduled meeting is October 31, 2024, and that will be an in-person meeting.

1. Act on Innovative Technology Grant Awards

Vera Brown, Director for

**Summary**

**Purpose:** *K.S.A. 74-32,430 establishes the Kansas Technology Innovation and Internship program to provide funds to career technical education institutions for start-up support for innovative technical courses or programs in emerging technologies, manufacturing, or areas of skill shortages. These funds are appropriated on an annual basis and awarded to institutions through a competitive grant process.*

**Eligible Institutions:** *Public postsecondary career technical education institutions delivering approved career technical education programs in Kansas.*

**Criteria for Innovative Technology Grant Awards:**

- Private business must provide financial or in-kind support, or any combination thereof, to the career technical education institution equaling 100% of the amount of the grant.

a. Automation Engineering Technology

**Summary**

*One of the foundational strategic priorities of the Postsecondary Technical Education Authority has been to enhance technical education in the state through the alignment of specific technical programs to ensure the needs of business and industry are consistently met. Program Alignment has four primary objectives: provide direct business and industry input regarding required and preferred technical skills needed as well as program exit points matching employment opportunities for graduates; identify nationally recognized third-party industry-recognized certifications; identify common and support courses within a program; and decrease the variability in program length. The TEA and KBOR approved Program Alignment process model was developed through cooperative efforts of community and technical college representatives, authority members, and KBOR staff.*

**Background**

One of the strategic priorities of the Postsecondary Technical Education Authority (TEA) is to enhance technical education in our state by the alignment of specific technical programs. This project is driven by the needs of business and industry in the state. Program Alignment consists of five phases:

- Phase I: Research and industry engagement.
- Phase II: Faculty engagement and aligning curriculum with certifications.
- Phase III: Approval of program structure and curriculum.
- Phase IV: Implementation.
- Phase V: Standards revision.

**Phase V: Standards Revision: Automation Engineer Technology (15.0406)**

The Automation Engineer Technology program was last realigned in 2014. At the time, two exit points were established (Technical Certificate C and an Associate of Applied Science degree) with five common courses.

Review of the Automation Engineer Technology alignment began in response to faculty contacting KBOR requesting a need for realignment due to the requests from local businesses for a quicker exit point into the workforce. A survey was sent to the relevant business and industry community to gauge the need for program realignment. The survey also requested interest in serving on the business and industry (B&I) committee. Eight business members completed the survey with four agreeing to be on the B&I committee. The members of that committee met on February 26, 2024, and agreed on several recommendations to bring to the faculty committee.

Automation Engineer Technology program administrators and faculty from two institutions (with a third providing feedback after the meeting) and KBOR staff met virtually on April 4, 2024, to begin the realignment process. The combined B&I and faculty committee recommended keeping the two existing award levels as well as adding Technical Certificates A and B. The Technical Certificate A would require two Common Courses (AC/DC Circuits and Industrial Fluid Power), three Support Courses (OSHA 10 or 30, Math, and Employability Skills/Interpersonal Communication), and would include the industry certification for OSHA 10 or 30. The Technical Certificate A would allow students to obtain sufficient knowledge and skills for entry level employment. The Technical Certificate B would require one additional common course (Programmable Logic Controllers) and one additional Support Course (Fundamentals of Motor Control/Electrical Control Systems I). The Technical Certificate C would require one additional common course (Industrial Robotics) and one additional Support Course (Actuator & Sensor Systems/Industrial Process Control). While not a requirement for employment, A.A.S. graduates will be prepared



to take and pass the Control Systems Technician (CST) exam through the International Society of Automation (ISA). All certificate levels and the A.A.S. degree option would provide institutional flexibility.

The committee then focused on courses required within the program. The addition of two entry level exit points provided a streamlined framework that allowed for the reclassification of Common Courses and Support Courses throughout the program. Common Courses will now include 13 credits: AC/DC Circuits, Industrial Fluid Power, Programmable Logic Controllers (PLC), and Industrial Robotics. Two additional Support Courses (Math and Employability Skills/Interpersonal Communication) were included due to identified B&I need and committee request at the Certificate A exit point. In addition, another Support Course (Fundamentals of Motor Control/Electrical Control Systems I) was included at B&I's request. While the Actuator & Sensor Systems/Industrial Process Control Common Course transitioning to a Support Course will provide institutional flexibility.

The attached proposed alignment map, reflecting the final combined recommendations from the B&I and Faculty committees, was issued for presidential comment from August 23, 2024, to September 10, 2024, with additional time added due to the Labor Day holiday. One faculty comment was received regarding the name of the Common Course, AC/DC Circuits, but was not agreed upon by the full committee.

**Recommendation**

The proposed revisions to the Automation Engineer Technology program alignment and course outcomes have been reviewed by the Technical Program and Curriculum Committee and are recommended for approval by the Technical Education Authority.

Program Alignment has four primary objectives: provide direct business and industry input regarding required and preferred technical skills needed as well as program exit points matching employment opportunities for graduates; identify nationally recognized third-party industry-recognized certifications; identify common and support courses within a program; and decrease the variability in program length. The TEA and KBOR approved Program Alignment process model was developed through cooperative efforts of community and technical college representatives, authority members, and KBOR staff.*

**Background**

This project is driven by the needs of business and industry in the state. Program Alignment consists of five phases:

**Phase V: Standards Revision: Industrial Machine/Maintenance Technology (47.0303)**

The Industrial Machine/Maintenance Technology program was last realigned in 2014. At the time, two exit points were established (Technical Certificate C and an Associate of Applied Science degree) with four common courses.

Review of the Industrial Machine/Maintenance Technology alignment began in response to faculty contacting KBOR requesting the need for realignment due to the requests from local businesses for a quicker exit point into the workforce. A survey was sent to the relevant business and industry community to gauge the need for program realignment. The survey also requested interest in serving on the business and industry (B&I) committee. Twenty business members completed the survey with ten agreeing to be on the B&I committee. The members of that committee met on March 18, 2024, and agreed on several recommendations to bring to the faculty committee.

Industrial Machine/Maintenance Technology program administrators and faculty from six institutions, one business, and KBOR staff met virtually on May 2, 2024, to begin the realignment process. This group recommended to change the name of the program from Industrial Machine Mechanic to Industrial Machine/Maintenance Technology to better reflect the career opportunities in this field. An institution's program title may include Machine *OR* Maintenance *OR* both for marketing purposes.

The combined B&I and faculty committee recommended keeping the two existing award levels as well as adding Technical Certificates A and B. The Technical Certificate A would require three Common Courses (AC/DC Circuits, Mechanical Systems, and Mechanical Systems Reliability), three Support Courses (OSHA 10, Math, and Employability Skills/Interpersonal Communication), and would include the industry certification for OSHA 10. The Technical Certificate A would allow students to obtain sufficient knowledge and skills for entry level employment. The Technical Certificate B would require one additional Common Course (Programmable Logic Controllers) and two additional Support Courses (Industrial Fluid Power/Fluid Power I & II and Fundamentals of Motor Control/Electrical Control Systems I). The Technical Certificate C would require one additional Common Course (Industrial Process Control) and one additional Support Course (Variable Speed Motor Controls/Electrical Control Systems II). While not a requirement for employment, A.A.S. graduates will be prepared to take and pass

the Certified Maintenance and Reliability Technician (CMRT) certification through the Society for Maintenance and Reliability Professionals (SMRP). All certificate levels and the A.A.S. degree option would provide institutional flexibility.

The committee then focused on courses required within the program. The addition of two entry level exit points provided a streamlined framework that allowed for the reclassification of Common Courses and Support Courses throughout the program. Common Courses will now include 16 credits: AC/DC Circuits, Mechanical Systems, mechanical Systems Reliability, Programmable Logic Controllers (PLC), and Industrial Process Control. One additional Support Course (Employability Skills/Interpersonal Communication) was included due to identified B&I need and committee request at the Certificate A exit point. Retaining the existing Support Courses will allow for a credit hour range to provide institutional flexibility for the configuration of lecture and lab work.

The attached proposed alignment map, reflecting the final combined recommendations from the B&I and Faculty committees, was issued for presidential comment from August 23, 2024, to September 10, 2024, with additional time added due to the Labor Day holiday. No comments were received that requested modifications to the proposed program alignment.

**Recommendation**

The proposed revisions to the Industrial Machine/Maintenance Technology program alignment and course outcomes have been reviewed by the Technical Program and Curriculum Committee and are recommended for approval by the Technical Education Authority.

**Summary and Staff Recommendation**

*To develop and enhance the talent pipeline for Kansas business and industry, new programs and/or additional programs are required. The Board office received requests from Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and Technology to offer a Technical Certificate B (42 credit hours) and an Associate of Applied Science (60 credit hours) in accounting, and a Technical Certificate A (24 credit hours) and an Associate of Applied Science (61 credit hours) in Quality Assurance Inspection.*

*The programs addressed all criteria requested and were subject to the 10-day comment period required by Board policy. The programs were reviewed by the Technical Education Authority’s Program and Curriculum Committee and are recommended for approval by the Technical Education Authority.*

**Background**

Community and technical colleges submit requests for new certificate and degree programs utilizing forms approved by Board staff. Criteria addressed during the application process include but are not limited to the following: program description, demand for the program, duplication of existing programs, faculty requirements, costs and funding, and program approval at the institution level.

**Description of Proposed Programs:**

**Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and Technology (WSU Tech)** requests approval of the following program:

- Accounting (52.0302) – Technical Certificate B/42 credit hours, and Associate of Applied Science/60 credit hours

The U.S. Department of Education’s Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP Code) 52.0302 describes an Accounting Technology/Technician and Bookkeeping program as one that prepares individuals to provide technical administrative support to professional accountants and other financial management personnel. The curriculum includes instruction in posting transactions to accounts, record-keeping systems, accounting software operation, and general accounting principles and practices.

Cross walking the proposed CIP Code 52.0302 (Accounting Technology/Technician and Bookkeeping) to occupations resulted in a match to one Standard Occupation Classification code (SOC): 43-3031 Bookkeeping, Accounting, and Auditing Clerks, which is defined as an occupation in which one would compute, classify, and record numerical data to keep financial records complete. Individuals would perform any combination of routine calculating, posting, and verifying duties to obtain primary financial data for use in maintaining accounting records, and may also check the accuracy of figures, calculations, and postings pertaining to business transactions recorded by other workers.



WSU Tech explained that the Business Administration program has included a technical certificate in accounting since 2019. In 2021, Koch Industries approached WSU Tech with a vision to cultivate its own talent in the accounting field, so WSU Tech, Koch Industries, and WSU worked together to create a specialized Accounting Technical Certificate as part of the WSU Tech Business Administration degree. This certificate is complemented by an applied learning opportunity with Koch industries, and the program has been so successful that in 2024, Koch Industries approached WSU Tech regarding the need for additional coursework. This prompted WSU Tech to develop a new program dedicated to accounting outside of a general business degree.

The proposed program consists of a 42-credit hour Technical Certificate, and a 60-credit hour Associate of Applied Science. Students will be prepared to sit for the American Institute of Professional Bookkeepers (AIPB) Certified Bookkeeper (CP) exam. WSU Tech anticipates enrollment of 20 students the first year, and 40 students in years two and three.

The Kansas Department of Labor Long-term Occupation Projections 2022-2032 indicate a statewide change of employment for Bookkeeping, Accounting, and Auditing Clerks (SOC: 43-3031) of -.5% annually, with an annual median wage of \$43,580. The typical education needed for occupation entry is some college, no degree, and annual openings equate to 2,171 jobs per year. This occupation is included in the most recent High Demand Occupation listing from the Kansas Department of Labor.

Lightcast job posting analytics show between September 2023 through September 2024, 3,733 total postings (1,554 unique postings) were advertised statewide. The annual median advertised salary was \$44,700. Removing job postings with no education level listed, 55% of postings indicate a high school diploma or equivalent for entry in the occupation.

WSU Tech explained that the proposed program is aligned with the Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment, the committee indicated that the concentrators information in CIP code 52 are focused on 52.0799 Business Management & Entrepreneurship (92) and 52.0801 Business Finance (205). The committee recognized that there is significant demand for accountants/auditors by calling out the number of job postings (545) on JobSEQ for the past 12 months.

Three letters of industry support for the proposed program were received from Daland Corp, Morrow & Co. LLC, and Koch Capabilities, LLC. Supports and commitments for the program include interviewing program graduates, providing internships, and advisory committee membership.

Currently, nine institutions offer a similar program based on CIP code and/or program title. Below are the colleges, programs, total number of concentrators, total number of graduates, total number of graduates exiting the higher education system and employed, and average wage of graduates who exited the higher education system and are employed information from the 2023 K-TIP report, which includes only technical programs in two-year postsecondary institutions.

WSU Tech contacted Butler Community College to discuss strategies for ensuring the success of the AAS option, however, are still waiting to receive a response. Program leadership is working with Pratt Community College on the selection of appropriate certifications for the program. During the development phase of the proposed Associate of Applied Science (AAS) in Accounting, WSU Tech collaborated closely with Koch Industries and WSU to create an effective curriculum pathway from WSU Tech to WSU. Wichita USD 259 provided a letter of support for the program.

The college plans to begin the proposed program in January 2025 and estimates the initial cost of the proposed program at \$88,553 total, including \$65,303 for new, full-time faculty, \$22,250 for new adjunct faculty and \$1,000 for instructional supplies and materials. Doug Maury, Dean of General Education and Professional Studies, will assume responsibility for the program.

The proposed program was subject to the 10-day comment period from September 26, 2024, to October 10, 2024, during which no comments were received.

**Recommendation**

The new program request submitted by Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and Technology for Technical Certificate B for 42 credit hours, and an Associate of Applied Science for 60 credit hours in accounting has been reviewed by the Technical Program and Curriculum Committee and is recommended for approval by the Technical Education Authority.



**Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and Technology (WSU Tech)** requests approval of the following program:

- Quality Assurance Inspection (15.0702) – Technical Certificate A/24 credit hours, and Associate of Applied Science/61 credit hours

The U.S. Department of Education’s Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP Code) 15.0702 describes a Quality Control Technology/Technician program as one that prepares individuals to apply basic engineering principles and technical skills in support of engineers and other professionals engaged in maintaining consistent manufacturing and construction standards. The curriculum includes instruction in quality control systems management principles, technical standards applicable to specific engineering and manufacturing projects, testing procedures, inspection procedures, related instrumentation and equipment operation and maintenance, and report preparation.

Cross walking the proposed CIP Code 15.0702 (Quality Control Technology/Technician) to occupations resulted in a match to one Standard Occupation Classification code (SOC): 51-9061 Inspectors, Tester, Sorters, Samplers, and Weighers, which is defined as an occupation in which one would inspect, test, sort, sample, or weigh nonagricultural raw materials or processed, machined, fabricated, or assembled parts or products for defects, wear, and deviations from specifications. Individuals may use precision measuring instruments and complex test equipment.

WSU Tech explained that the proposal is the result of initial discussions in 2022 between Textron Aviation and WSU Tech, concerning the need for skilled workers to fill quality assurance positions. Additionally, a Quality Assurance Summit was held in August 2023 with multiple industry partners which reinforced the need for a formalized program for this occupation.

The proposed program consists of a 24-credit hour Technical Certificate A, and a 61-credit hour Associate of Applied Science. Students will earn the OSHA 10 certification and anticipates annual enrollment of 10 students in year one and two, and 15 students in year three.

The Kansas Department of Labor Long-term Occupation Projections 2022-2032 indicate a statewide change of employment for Inspectors, Tester, Sorters, Samplers, and Weighers (SOC: 51-9061) of .1% annually, with an annual median wage of \$50,200. Typical education needed for occupation entry is a high school diploma or equivalent, and annual openings equate to 884 jobs per year. This occupation is included in the most recent High Demand / High Wage Occupation listing from the Kansas Department of Labor.

Lightcast job posting analytics show between September 2023 through September 2024, 3,257 total postings (1,294 unique postings) were advertised statewide. The annual median advertised salary was \$47,700. Removing job postings with no education level listed, 74% of postings indicate a high school diploma or equivalent for entry in the occupation.

WSU Tech noted that the 2025-2026 Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment report identified this SOC code was specifically addressed as an occupation in which a pathway is not currently offered but needed.

Five letters of industry support for the proposed program were received from The Atlas Group – WASI Division, KMI, Metal Finishing Company, SQSystems and Cox Machine Incorporated, and commitments for the program include interviewing program graduates, providing internships, assisting with curriculum development, and serving on the advisory board.

Currently, this program is not offered by other institutions. While Barton Community College offers a program in the same CIP code of 15.0702, that program provides training specifically for Scale Technicians, and focuses on

the skills necessary to install, repair and certify commercial and non-commercial scales. As such, WSU Tech determined to put its collaboration efforts into ensuring that industry drove the curriculum's development, using the Business & Industry Leadership Team (BILT) model for the program advisory committee. Renwick USD 267 provided a letter of support for the program.

The college plans to begin the proposed program in the Fall of 2025 and estimates the initial cost of the proposed program at \$63,000 total, including \$62,000 for new, full-time faculty and \$1,000 for instructional supplies and materials. Funding will be provided from the institutional budget in the New Program Development fund. Mark Scott, Dean of Manufacturing will assume responsibility for the program.

The proposed program was subject to the 10-day comment period from September 26, 2024, to October 10, 2024, during which no comments were received.

**Recommendation**

The new program request submitted by Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and Technology for a Technical Certificate A for 24 credit hours and an Associate of Applied Science for 61 credit hours, in Quality Assurance Inspection has been reviewed by the Technical Program and Curriculum Committee and is recommended for approval by the Technical Education Authority.

3. Act on New Promise Act Program  
Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and  
Technology: Quality Assurances Inspection (15.0702)

**Summary**

*The Kansas Legislature enacted the Kansas Promise Scholarship Act, which provides scholarships for students to attend an eligible postsecondary education institution. Eligible programs would be any two-year associate degree program, career and technical education certificate, or stand-alone program that correspond to high wage, high demand, or critical need in:*

- *four specified fields of study (information technology and security; mental and physical healthcare; advanced manufacturing and building trades; and early childhood education and development).*
- *one college designated field of study from the specified list (Agriculture; Food and Natural Resources; Education and Training; Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security; or Distribution and Logistics).*
- *transfer programs with an established 2+2 and/or articulation agreements.*

**Background**

On May 23, 2022, Governor Kelly signed 2022 Senate Substitute for House Bill 2567, which adopted changes in the Kansas Program Scholarship Act, K.S.A. 2022 Supp. 74-32,271 et seq. The Act also maintains that the Board of Regents will administer the program. Administration is broken into three categories: rules and regulations, eligible programs, and other responsibilities.

Per statutory language (K.S.A. 2022 Supp. 74-32,271(b)(4) and K.S.A. 2022 Supp. 74-32,272(c)(1)(B)), a “promise eligible program” means any two-year associate degree program or career and technical education certificate or stand-alone program offered by an eligible postsecondary educational institution that is:

- a) approved by the Board of Regents;
- b) high wage, high demand, or critical need; and
- c) identified as a “promise eligible program” by the Board of Regents pursuant to K.S.A. 2022 Supp. 74-32,272, within any of the following fields of study:
  - Information Technology and Security
  - Mental and Physical Healthcare
  - Advanced Manufacturing and Building Trades
  - Early Childhood Education and Development

K.S.A. 2022 Supp. 74-32,272(a) states an eligible postsecondary educational institution may designate an additional field of study to meet local employment needs if the promise eligible programs within this field are two-year associate degree programs or career and technical education certificate and stand-alone programs approved by the Board of Regents that correspond to jobs that are high wage, high demand, or critical need in the community from one of the following fields:

- Agriculture;
- Food and Natural Resources;
- Education and Training;
- Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security; or
- Distribution, Logistics, and Transportation

K.S.A. 2022 Supp. 74-32,272(d) states that the Board of Regents may designate an associate degree transfer program as an eligible program only if such program is included in:

- a) An established 2+2 agreement with a Kansas four-year postsecondary education institution; or
- b) An articulation agreement with a Kansas four-year postsecondary educational institution and is part of an established degree pathway that allows a student to transfer at least sixty credit hours from the

eligible from the eligible postsecondary educational institution to a four-year postsecondary education institution for the completion of an additional sixty credit hours toward a bachelor's degree.

**Recommendation**

The following program is seeking approval to become a Promise Act eligible program. The program has been reviewed by the Technical Education Authority's Technical Program and Curriculum Committee and is recommended for approval by the Technical Education Authority:

- Wichita State University Campus of Applied Sciences and Technology: Quality Assurance Inspection (15.0702) – falls under the Advanced Manufacturing and Building Trades category specified in legislation. SOC 51-9061 for Inspectors, Testers, Sorters, Samplers, and Weighers was identified as a High Demand/High Wage occupation on the 2024 High Demand Occupations list from the Kansas Department of Labor.

**1. Act on Course Bucket Review**

Charmine Chambers, Director

**Summary**

*The Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) Cost Model uses four cost components: Instructor + Instructional Support + Institutional Support + Extraordinary Costs. Each technical program in the system is assigned a specific Instructor and Extraordinary Cost rate. Individual courses are assigned to “buckets” to group like courses together, and each “bucket,” is assigned a program composite rate based upon use of the course within programs by each institution. Funding is calculated using a total per credit hour composite rate for each course.*

**Background**

The KBOR Cost Model was developed in response to the Legislature’s 2007 directive that the Technical Education Authority (TEA) “develop and recommend to the state board of regents a credit hour funding distribution formula for postsecondary technical education training programs that: (i) is tiered to recognize and support cost differentials in providing high-demand, high-tech training; (ii) takes into consideration target industries critical to the Kansas economy; (iii) is responsive to program growth; and (iv) includes other factors and considerations as deemed necessary or advisable . . . .” K.S.A. 74-32,402(a)(11)(A).

A total calculated course rate is established for every program, and each course in the Kansas Higher Education Data System (KHEDS) has been assigned to a “bucket,” based upon course subject matter or course title. Enrolled credit hours reported for each course “bucket” in the system calculate at the program rate which the course is tied to in KHEDS. There are 25 cost model composite rates, which for 2023 range from \$232/per credit hour (non-tiered rate) to \$538/per credit hour (Tiered rates).

**Course Bucket Review Methodology and Project Framework**

Review of the bucket assignments began in 2023 based upon questions from institutions regarding Pharmacology and Practicum course bucket assignments. During the investigation, each tiered Pharmacology course was reviewed in KHEDS to determine for which program(s) the institution utilized the course. The TEA approved bucket changes for Pharmacology in October 2023. Practicum courses were identified as requiring additional evaluation due to overlap with Clinical and Internship courses, and Board staff identified several additional non-program-specific buckets requiring additional examination.

For the second year of the project, the following buckets were identified as not program specific. Course use by individual institution and program in KHEDS was evaluated, and the potential bucket assignments were identified as needing to be updated. Buckets include but are not limited to:

- Practicum
- Clinical
- Internship
- Field Experience
- Cooperative Education
- Blueprint
- Project Management
- Quality Management
- Risk Management
- Measurement

Including the above-listed course buckets, approximately 40% of all courses were reviewed in sections based upon the field of study of the course bucket. Field of study is determined by course use by individual institution and program in KHEDS.

The year three project plan (and on-going as needed) is for the remaining courses (approximately 60%) to be reviewed in sections, and courses will be assigned to the program-specific bucket as identified by use of the course by institution in Program Inventory in KHEDS. For courses that are utilized in multiple programs, KHEDS will be

used to evaluate the Declared Majors (by program) taking the course or the total Concentrators in the program from the previous year.

The project approach and recommendation for course re-assignment was reviewed by the Budget and Finance Committee meeting. Representatives from the community and technical colleges expressed their support for the process to ensure that the appropriate Institutional Calculated State Share is accurate for all enrollments reported.

**Recommendation**

The re-assignment of the attached courses into program-specific buckets for AY2024 funding calculations was reviewed by the Technical Education Authority’s Budget and Finance Committee and is recommended for approval.

B. Other Matters

1. State of Nursing in Kansas Report

Dr. Amy Garcia, Director of the Kansas Nursing Workforce Center

**Summary**

*Formed in August 2023, the Kansas Nursing Workforce Center’s mission is to ensure that every Kansan has access to quality nursing care when and where it is needed and to support the nurse as an individual and as a member of the healthcare team.*

**Background**

The Kansas Nursing Workforce Center is based at the University of Kansas School of Nursing. The Center is an official member of the National Forum of State Nursing Workforce Centers.

**Focus Areas**

- Measure the things that matter to educate, retain, and sustain the nursing workforce
- Identify nursing care deserts across the state, and across nursing specialties
- Convene stakeholders to address systemic issues
- Facilitate research

The Center’s goal is to collaborate with partners across industries to improve the lives of nurses, Kansans, and their communities by connecting stakeholders to the data required to make informed decisions about the nursing workforce.

**The State of Nursing in Kansas Report** is the source of credible information about nurses and nursing in Kansas. The report is based on data collected from disparate sources. The accuracy of this report is dependent on the information submitted by these sources. The report also includes original and attributed research and serves as a vital resource for workforce research, decision making and program development, as well as the formulation of public policy and funding plans.

The State of Nursing in Kansas report will be updated in 2025, and then every two years when the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) releases new data, which facilitates the comparison of Kansas with other states in the country. This biennial report will be followed with a series of focused reports on specific areas of nursing.

2. Update on Kansas Apprenticeships

Shonda Anderson, Director of Apprenticeship and Internship

**Summary**

*The Kansas Office of Registered Apprenticeship supports apprenticeships across multiple industries to benefit employers and career seekers ensuring occupational proficiency.*

**Background**

Governor Laura Kelly established the Office of Registered Apprenticeship by signing Executive Order #22-07 on September 6, 2022. To meet the talent needs of Kansas businesses, the Office of Registered Apprenticeship is tasked with:

- Evaluating and reporting annually on the extent, quality, and impact of registered apprenticeships in Kansas.
- Developing strategies to modernize the registered apprenticeship program to include additional industries such as healthcare, IT, agricultural manufacturing, and distribution and logistics.
- Developing and advocating for registered apprenticeship program policies that place a special focus on veterans, women, people of color, those formerly incarcerated, and others with barriers to successful employment.

In November of 2022, the Kansas Postsecondary Technical Education Authority reviewed and established an approval process for Registered Apprenticeship programs. The approval process is based on the Higher Learning Commission, the United States Department of Education, the Federal Department of Labor Office of Apprenticeship, and the American Association of Community College information. The process articulates traditional career technical education programs to apprenticeship opportunities.

Shonda Anderson serves as the Director of Apprenticeship and Internship with the Office of Registered Apprenticeship at the Kansas Department of Commerce.

3. Kansas Industry and Labor Expansion Grant Results

Vera Brown, Director of Career Technical Education

**Summary**

*The Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act (Perkins V) is the primary federal funding source to states for the improvement of secondary and postsecondary career and technical education programs. The purpose of the Act is to develop more fully the academic, career, and technical skills of secondary and postsecondary students who elect to enroll in career and technical education programs.*

**Background**

Originally passed as the Vocational Education Act of 1963, The Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act (Perkins V) was reauthorized in 2018 to increase learner access to high-quality career and technical education (CTE) programs of study. Perkins V Sec. 112(c)(2) specifically addresses “development, implementation, and adoption of programs of study or career pathways aligned with State-identified high-skill, high-wage, or in-demand occupations or industries.”

**Summary**

The focus of the Industry and Labor Force Expansion grant was to address the needs of Kansas employers by growing programs which prepare skilled workforce for a specific industry demand. Each applicant identified a new or growing Kansas employer who would benefit from skilled workers in a specific occupation.

Nine postsecondary institutions were selected by the application review committee to expand existing programs in order to support fast-growing or emerging industries in Kansas. The grant award period was intentionally set for a two-year period to allow institutions to complete large-scale projects. Each recipient identified strategies to sustain the proposed activities following the grant period. A total of \$941,128 was distributed to participating institutions.

**Results**

**Barton Community College** purchased technology to deliver synchronous nursing education and hired a faculty member from industry to expand the Practical Nursing and Associate Degree Nursing programs. Survey results indicated that 100% of the participating students saw learning benefits in the additional technology. Barton Community College's effort to expand their programs was triggered by partnerships with Pratt Regional Medical Center, University of Kansas Health Systems, Kiowa County Memorial Hospital, Haviland Care Center, Medicine Lodge, and the Health Departments from Pratt and Stafford counties.

**Fort Scott Community College** expanded the welding program by adding and equipping additional welding booths to support an increased number of students per cohort. The following businesses were identified as having need for welders: Doherty Steel, Unique Metals Fabrication Inc., Niece Equipment, Mid-America Pipe, Twister Trailers, AZZ Enclosure Systems, and RTL Fabrication.

**Independence Community College** brought an industry professional to campus as a guest lecturer, purchased additional personal protective equipment to provide a variety of PPE sizes, and purchased industry-standard equipment to modernize the program. Regional veterinary employers, including Heartland Vet Partners, Blue Pearl Pet Hospital, and Mission Vet System were identified as area industry partners for ICC.

**Johnson County Community College** purchased equipment and hired a new faculty member for the Automation Engineer Technology program to increase its capacity. The college noted the new trainers would also likely be used with local employers. Specifically, Panasonic Energy of North America is a major employer in the region, which will increase the demand for AET program graduates.

**Kansas City Kansas Community College** hired a new faculty member for the Welding Technology program, which increased the capacity of the program. KCKCC also developed new curriculum for Automation Engineer Technology, Welding, and Electrical Engineering programs. Panasonic Energy of North America is a leading employer in the region and will need skilled workers in these occupations to fulfill their workforce needs.

**Manhattan Area Technical College** expanded the welding lab by adding and equipping welding booths to support an increased demand at their Wamego Center and modernizing the computer numerical control (CNC) capability in the main campus welding lab. Businesses in the area, including Caterpillar and Landoll, expressed a need for more certified welders.

**Northwest Kansas Technical College** (Fort Hays Tech | Northwest) purchased industry-standard equipment to modernize the Electrical Technology program. The need for additional equipment for the program was expressed by the program's advisory committee. Davis Electric, Inc. was identified as the local business partner triggering the expansion.

**Washburn University** hired instructors to increase capacity in the Diagnostic Medical Sonography program and provided faculty stipends for curriculum revision. Diagnostic Medical Sonography faculty noted that the program's enrollment nearly doubled since the start of the project. Industry partners included KUMC-St Francis Campus, Sabetha Hospital, Hiawatha Hospital, Holton Hospital, and Hutchinson Hospital. **Washburn Institute of Technology** purchased industry-standard equipment to modernize the Automotive Service Technician program. Partner businesses included local automotive industry employers Laird Noller and Goodyear Tire.

**WSU Tech** expanded the Carpentry/Construction Science program with an additional full-time instructor, implemented new curriculum, and added industry-standard equipment. The college reported a 49% increase in credit hours from AY23 to AY24. Efforts to expand the program were prompted by partnership with Crain Company 3D, LLC. The college also modernized the Vet Nursing lab equipment and provided professional development for instructors. The college noted 100% of the Vet Tech cohort was placed in the field. Veterinary Emergency and Specialty Hospital of Wichita supported the initiative.
